My name is Megan Dierking and I will be attending the University of Missouri-Columbia to study Music Education. I began my time as a JC Barracuda when I was seven years old in 2013. Coach Don was my coach who taught me how to do flip turns by getting in the pool with me! One of the most difficult decisions I have had to make was when I decided to quit the swim team after 8 years of competitive swimming (7 with JC Barracudas) to focus more on playing french horn and mellophone with the band.

Through the swim team, I made many friends and memories, as well as many accomplishments. For example, I was constantly improving my times at meets and placing well at meets that had people from many different states. Not only that but I spent my time after school practicing every day and during the summer. I planned to make it far in swimming and to compete at the college level and maybe even further, but I had to make a decision between band and swimming because I could not accomplish what I wanted to in both at the same time as well as manage school and a job. When I quit swimming I felt bittersweet because now I have more time to practice band but I would also be missing that part of me that I grew up with. But now because of the difficult decision I was able to make it to the All-State band after practicing a lot. I also auditioned and made the DCI Colts Drum and Bugle Corp this summer. The summer tour lasts approximately 80 days during which the corps will travel over 10,000 miles throughout the United States, participating in over 30 regional, national, and international performances and competitions.
